

The title points to the use of blues for sea and skies and this exhibition emphasises the recent use of the Cyprus scene by outstanding young artists.

It began with the first-rate exhibition of paintings by Aristoteles Demetriou in Nicosia earlier this autumn at Gloria's (Aristoteles is also from Paphos), and suggests there are the beginnings of a Cyprus Landscape Group; artists who extend our understanding of the Cyprus scene.

I suggest the group is called 'Pyli Paphos' as this will also cover those also opening the gates of the landscape who live as far away from Paphos as Nicosia, where Paphos Gate is -and all creative studies in between, and even further.

NITSA Hadjigeorghiou's exhibition can be seen from Sunday although the official opening will be on Thursday when the Minister of Education will speak at 7.30 pm.

Nitsa is a Delhi prizewinner and is right here in the very front rank of Cypriot painters. Her work can be abstract or evoke the landscape/city scape and at New-Delhi she showed haunting pictures related to pollution. Recently -- at Aglandjia and the Cyprus University -- she has suggested a change of direction by using the motif of musical instruments, but all her work is stamped with her own visual sensibility. Viewers, as well as the many supportive artists, who will visit her show can look forward to something very special.

WEEKEND Kathikas

A COLOURFUL exhibition and sale of arts and crafts organised from finely-meshed wire netting and plaster.

In the top hall of the Leventis she has placed a wire and plaster sculpture whose head has sweeping hair flying high, as if Edvard Munch had given a lending hand. This is a clever extension of the charcoal drawings the artist showed at her studio last win-

By the door and on the floor little mesh shoes lead us to the exhibition. The two plaster figures inside are excellent. In one, little feet give you a jolt, while, in the other, a brass lower arm and hand send out a shudder of survivalistic toughness.

Elsewhere the room is full of very delicate wire models and a few wire shoes scattered here and there. However, the main thing about these objects is the shadow thrown onto the walls.

Because the wire mesh is made of fine squares, the shadow suggests cross-hatching. The overlaps of the mesh caused by forms in the original object create the illusion of extra pencil shading while any piece of paper 'usually thin) makes a soft 'filled


